






Donor Family as ambassador for the process



## The Positivity of a Thank You



### **Donor Family Perspective**

- Appreciation
- Sense of pride
- Recognition of donor legacy
- Reaffirms positivity of decision to donate

#### **Recipient Perspective**

- Acknowledgement
- Outlet for gratitude
- Relief of unwarranted guilt
- Closure



## PhD Research: 'The Emotional Management of Suffering during the Transplantation Process'

- Methodology: Semistructured interviews and observation
- Sample Demographics:
   Organ Transplant
   Recipients

- 14 males, 4 females
- Age range 26-75
- 13 deceased donation
- 5 live donation

- 8 kidney recipients
- 8 liver recipients
- 1 pancreas recipient
- 1 heart recipient

# FindingsRecipient Letter Writing/Exchanges (Deceased Donation)

- Mixed feelings about letter writing and potential contact with donor families
- 4 key sub-headings
  - Recipients who wrote with no response from the donor family (n=5)
  - Recipients wrote but did not want a response (n=7)
  - Recipient wrote a letter and met with their donor family (n=1)
  - Recipient who had received 4 transplants has never thanked donor family (n=1)



# How can Sociology make sense of this? The Paradoxical Nature of Transplant

- Individuals have their own personal expectations from what they expect from writing/contact with donor families.
- The letter writing process is
  - complex
  - creates levels of anxiety
  - ambiguous
- Recipients are unsure as to when is the right time to write



## In Summary

Recipients are unsure or do not write a thank you letter because of the following factors:

- Uncertainty regarding whether the donor family would like to hear from them
- They need more help on writing the letter
- They feel the letter highlights the loss of the donor family and makes recipients feel guilty
- A complicated and emotional transaction. Not a straightforward process.



## What can NHSBT do?

- Manage expectations of the donor families
- Take onus off 'letter writing' and facilitate other means of acknowledgement
- Simplify the process more clear cut and less ambiguous
- Feedback the data to transplant centres
- Survey on-going to understand reasons why recipients don't write
- Support the development of best practice guidance



## How you can help us?

- Make it normal and expected to say thank you to the donor's family
- Provide as much information as the recipient will allow when asked for updates.
